- 6. When sick read Matthew 9:1-8; James 5:13-16.
- When in sorrow over death read John 11 and 14.
- 8. When weary and heavy laden read Isaiah 55.
- 9. When things go against you read Psalm 27.
- 10. When your faith is weak read Hebrews 11.
- 11. When you have the blues read Psalm 34, John 14.
- 12. When you are discontented read Psalm 37:7; Proverbs 16:8,
- When you can't understand read Romans 8:28.
- 14. To find the way to God read John 14:6.
- 15. When you need help to overcome an inferiority complex read I Cor. 5:10; Luke 12:6-7; Acts 20:32.
- 16. If something is too big to handle read Philipians 4:13.

As a young pastor, when my church burned to the ground, I needed a verse to hide in. I found it in Romans 8:28. I went on, knowing that God would work it out for the good. He did, and here I am, over 59 years of preaching later, still going strong for Him. Don't ever give up.
