Look People in the Eye

KING JAMES BIBLE, PAST AND FUTURE

The Devil hates the Word of God and now we see much of the hostility that he has stirred up against the Bible and Christianity in America. It has not always been so. In 1982, Newsweek discussed the impact of the Bible on America:

"For centuries, the Bible has exerted an unrivaled influence on American culture, politics and social life. Now historians are discovering that the Bible, perhaps even more than the Constitution, is our founding document: the source of the powerful myth of the United States as a special, sacred nation, a people called by God to establish a model society, a beacon to the world.

"There was a time, early in the history of our nation, when rugged settlers piously named their newly founded towns and cities after places in the Bible—Salem, Canaan, Philadelphia, Shiloh, Nazareth, Bethlehem and even Eden and Paradise. There were times, too, when Bible study was the core of public education and nearly every literate family not only owned a Bible but read it regularly and reverently."

A few years later Time magazine described the spiritual origin of America with these words: "Ours is the only country founded on a good idea. That good idea combines a commitment to man's inalienable rights with the Calvinist belief in an ultimate moral right and sinful man's obligation to do good. These articles, embodied in the Declaration of Independence and in the Constitution, literally govern our lives today."
