Our Bible is our sword and shield --Road-map to heaven too; And every word and every verse


Is perfect and is true.

While heathen go to hell.


Why should we preach a thousand times To those within the fold, And leave a thousand million souls Unreached, unsought, untold.

"THE WAY OUT!"

In 1849, Louis Harms, a discouraged pastor of a small, indifferent congregation, in a country church in Germany, after prayer and study of the Word, announced his purpose "to initiate a vital missionary program as "the way out." The response of eight volunteers to the mission field started his program.

After seventeen years conducting the missionary enterprise, the little church, with barely 60 members enjoyed the unprecedented, perennial revival, of bringing 10,000 members into the church fold.

On the mission field by 1883, thirty years after the first missionaries sailed, 375 missionaries had established 30 mission stations gathering from the heathen 3,920 communicants and 8,520 adherents.

Contemplating going to the poorhouse thirty years ago, that struggling little church had been enriched until it was the envy of practically all of Christendom.
